# Notice to Nipissing First Nation Membership and Residents

A Smoking Law is proposed for enactment at the Council meeting scheduled for <u>May 17, 2017</u>. It is proposed to come into force on <u>May 17, 2018</u>. The purpose of this notice is to inform you of the proposed law and make it known that it is available on the Nipissing First Nation website. A hard copy can be mailed to you or emailed to you if you provide the Land Office staff with your email address.

The law was developed in the interest of promoting health, safety and welfare of all residents and employees of Nipissing First Nation to prohibit or regulate smoking in public places and places of employment, on Nipissing First Nation.

You will have until **April 7, 2017** to submit any comments and requests for revisions of the proposed law.

Please contact the Land Office at 705-753-2922 should you wish to receive a hard copy of the proposed law.

## ANISHINABEK EDUCATION SYSTEM (A.E.S.) LIPDATE

The A.E.S. is moving forward with 22 First Nations as a result of the vote that took place late last year. Following the vote, each First Nation sent voting members to an A.E.S. meeting in Toronto that took place January 24-25, 2017. Deputy-Chief Muriel Sawyer and Fran Couchie, Education Committee member represented Nipissing First Nation. An interim Kinoomaadziwin Education Body (KEB) was elected. Marianna Couchie, Catherine Pawis and Nicole King were elected to represent Regional Education Committee (REC) #4 which consists of the these nations; Nipissing, Dokis, Wahnapitae, Magnatewan, Henvey Inlet, Wasauksing and Moose Deer Point.

A.E.S., K.E.B, community leadership/administration and provincial school boards met in Toronto on February 13 & 14, 2017 to discuss next step in moving forward. Education Minister, Mitzie Hunter, told the participants, "If you want to go fast then go along. If you want to go far then go in a group." These encouraging words support the idea that all parties must work together to ensure success.

Each First Nation must write their own law that is suited to their community and students' needs.


#### N B I S I I N G S E C O N D A R Y S C H O O L

On February 22nd, the Provincial School-College-Work Initiative in partnership with Canadore College, invited our students to participate in Kendaaswin Day.



Students learned cultural teachings and new skills from our local knowledge keepers. As well, we each made our own hand drum and toured the various programs available at the college. On May 26th, we are going to have a feast for our new drums.





Many of our students attended a workshop at the YMCA on Friday, March 3rd as a Youth Engagement gathering. Nipissing University's Dr. Mike DeGagne spoke to the students about reconciliation and reminded everyone that the proc-

ess began a long time ago at Fort Niagara in 1764, as a follow-up to the Royal Proclamation of 1763. He advocated for a continued vision of an Indigenous path as Canadians define their way. The students then shared their ideas for YMCA services for Indigenous youth. Our students gave many positive suggestions.



In Grade 9 English we have been learning about the Nipissing Warriors and are looking forward to watching the documentary produced by Regan Pictures, Dr. Katrina Srigley and Glenna Beaucage when we get back from March Break.

Seven of our senior students are involved in Dual Credits at Canadore College and eight are on Cooperative Education Placements in our community.

Our school, along with other North Bay area high schools, went to the Capitol Centre for the Robb Nash concert on March 8th. Through his music, Robb Nash and his band bring a positive message to high school students and youth.

Hello, Aannii, Boozhoo, Greetings,

We are all doing well here at the Right Path Counselling & Prevention Services. The weather is slowly getting warmer so spring must be just around the corner. April 1st begins the new start of programming activities, and new events. So keep an eye out for flyers, postings on Facebook and road signs for events. I have heard through the grapevine more people are trying to guit smoking. This is really good news to me and I wish you all Good Luck and keep up the Quit Smoking attempts; they say "the more you try, the more likely you are to quit for life, no one expects this to happen over night it takes time and patience. Speaking of smoking cessation Wednesday April 5th, we will have Alicia Topp from the Aboriginal Cancer Care Ontario doing a presentation. We will be having 2 - Let's Talk About Smoking Cessation Sessions at the LCHC. The first session will be for youth 12 years to 17 years of age from 4:30 PM to 6: 00 PM. The second session will be for Youth and Adults 18 years and up from 6:30 to 7:30PM. We will have updated information for smoking cessation and tips on how to control the cravings.

Did You Know most of the nicotine replacement therapies are covered through Non-insured Health if you are a status member all you will require a prescription from your doctor or nurse practitioner. See the posting below for the information.

Having good health means striking a balance in all aspects of your life: social, physical, spiritual. economic and mental, reaching a balance is a learning process. Problems such as addictions and mental health issues can take many forms, just as physical illnesses do. Mental illnesses are still feared and misunderstood by many people, but the fear will disappear as people learn more about them. The same goes for addictions no one regardless of social status, economic condition or educational level is immune from suffering from either Most times addictions and mental health go together hand in hand as many people try to cure their physical and mental health issues with drugs and alcohol. These types of problems can affect anyone, regardless of intelligence, social class or income level. The lives of people with addictions and mental health conditions are often plagued by stigma as well as discrimination.

- Must be able to stand, walk, sit, climb or balance, stoop, kneel or crouch. The employee must regularly lift and /or move up to 10 pounds, frequently lift and/or move up to 25 pounds and occasionally lift and/or move up to 50 pounds.
- Must have WHIMIS.
- Must have CPR/First Aid.
- Must be able to demonstrate knowledge of Health & Safety (OHSA) awareness and practices.
- Must be able to work a flexible schedule.

- Good communication skills, including an appreciation of the need for tact, discretion and a positive, cheerful and informed approach with the public.

## Aboriginal Scholarships

#### Introduction

The Faculty of Medicine's Youth Summer Program (MED YSP) is a unique university-led science program based at the University of Toronto (UofT) and run by the Division of Teaching Laboratories (DTL) in the Faculty of Medicine. Since 2008, MED YSP has been offering Canadian and International high school students an opportunity to explore the excitement of scientific inquiry as well as career opportunities in medicine, medical research, and other health-related fields.

Over the last 6 years MED YSP provided over 30 fully-funded scholarships for Aboriginal youth to attend the program. In order to provide this opportunity to even more Aboriginal youth from urban, rural and remote communities, we are looking to work with individuals/schools/organizations that can help by: a) be the contact point for their community b) disseminate information about this opportunity and c) together provide a financial means for Aboriginal youth to explore medical careers and post-secondary education.

#### Overview

The program runs from July 10 to August 4th, 2017 and is open to students currently enrolled in Grade 10, 11, or 12.

A unique modular-based approach has been used to provide students with a diverse set of subject areas and flexibility. The program consists of four distinctive one-week long modules centered along the following disciplines: physiology, molecular genetics and forensics, pharmacology & toxicology, and microbiology. Each module features lectures by world-renowned professors, clinicians and researchers, tours of research facilities, and an array of "hands on" activities among many other components. Sample of laboratories that students conduct include DNA extraction from buccal cells, spirometry, genotyping, antibiotic resistance tests, caffeine clinical trials, DNA fingerprinting, HPLC, blood pressure and many more. DTL in collaboration with the Basic Science Departments (Departments of Physiology, Pharmacology and Toxicology, Biochemistry, and Microbiology) designed the MED YSP program. Further, students participate in the exploration of medicine, medical research, career opportunities, and what they should be thinking about and doing in high school to prepare themselves for post-secondary admission and education.

# Spring Cleaning Your Yard? Some things to consider before Open Air Burning

**Nipissing First Nation – April 2017, Nipissing First Nation Fire Service** is advising residents to contact them regarding any restrictions with open air burning, before starting any fires or burning brush.

With spring outdoor cleanup starting, we know some folks choose to burn brush and yard debris on their property, cleaning up debris and limiting the level of flammable vegetation surrounding your home is a good practice. But make sure the way you do it is safe – for you, your home, your neighbors, and the surrounding area.

Open air burning can include the use of outdoor fireplaces and cooking fires not involving the use of a barbeque. Some outdoor appliances used are not recommended because there is potential for personal injury, property damage and increased risk of a grass fire.

Whether in the backyard of your home, the cottage or at a campground, make fire safety a priority. Open air burning, especially if left unattended, can become difficult to control and can result in a serious widespread fire. We suggest using a fireplace to prevent any fires from getting out of control. Please have ways to extinguish the fire available to you such as a garden hose, shovel, and buckets of sand that can be used should you lose control of the flames. Please keep fires small as to not send sparks flying into other areas where you cannot extinguish them.


