Update on Community Consultation Meetings

As advised in the Discussion Paper we mailed to every household in early April, we held three Community Consultation Meetings with webcasts to discuss proposed investments that could be made with the interest income earned in 2014 from the Boundary Land Claim Trust Fund. We also invited feedback through a variety of other methods including feedback forms, phone calls, email and social media for those who could not attend the meetings in person or by webcast.

The three meetings had 140 people in attendance, with another 160 people online through the webcasts for a total of 300 participants. We also received 60 feedback forms and dozens of emails, phone calls and social media comments/messages from citizens wishing to express their ideas and recommendations on how these new revenues could benefit Nipissing First Nation as a whole, now and in the future.

The Discussion Paper highlighted four proposed streams of investment/distribution: Community Development, Economic Development, Social Development and Direct Benefits for the Debendaagziwaad (Citizens). Overall, these four streams were well-received and the consultations brought forward many new ideas to consider.

Next Steps

Members of the Administration team compiled all of the feedback received from the membership and presented a preliminary report to Council on Tuesday, May 19th. The preliminary report will be shared with the membership through our website and Facebook page (Nipissing First Nation Administration). NFN remains committed to the stewardship of Lake Nipissing and the walleye fishery

Spring Moratorium

Nipissing First Nation implemented a short-term moratorium on the cultural practice of spearing, as well as a complete moratorium on gill-netting until the sports fishery season opened on May 16th.

These measures were taken as a result of the feedback we heard from nation members at the Fisheries Consultation meetings we held last fall to discuss proposed regulation changes and methods to manage impacts on Lake Nipissing's walleye population.

Members voiced their concerns and made strong recommendations, which were sanctioned by Chief & Council through these new regulations that are meant to ensure the health of the walleye fishery now and into the future.

Chi-Miigwech to our Compliant Fishermen

We wish to sincerely thank all community members who complied with the new fishing regulations. You helped boost the success rate of this year's spawn and ensure the long-term growth and sustainability of the lake and the fishery.

Violations & Enforcement

Unfortunately, we experienced a high number of violations to the moratorium this spring. Those who chose to ignore the parameters of the commercial fishery did so at the expense of compliant fishers and the community at large.

The Natural Resources Department continues to actively monitor the situation by patrolling and documenting violations. A Restorative Justice program is being established to hold persons who violate NFN's Fisheries Law accountable for their actions and to deter repeat offenders. Concerned community members can report violations by leaving a message on our Anonymous Tip Line - **(705) 753-6999 ext. 1263.**

Summary of Changes to Fisheries Law

- ⇒ Expanded regulations for commercial fishermen, which include reducing the number of **nets permitted from 5 to 3** and changing the allowable net size to a **minimum of 3.75"**
- ⇒ Registered commercial fishermen can **exchange nets** at no cost at the Fisheries Office
- ⇒ Mandated closing the season when target number is reached, which will be decided by NFN's Council based on monthly catch reports provided by the Natural Resources Department
- ⇒ Other initiatives aimed at reducing the stress on the fishery include the development of a small-scale hatchery for educational purposes, as well as the implementation of a Community Beautification Program to create new seasonal jobs in our nation.

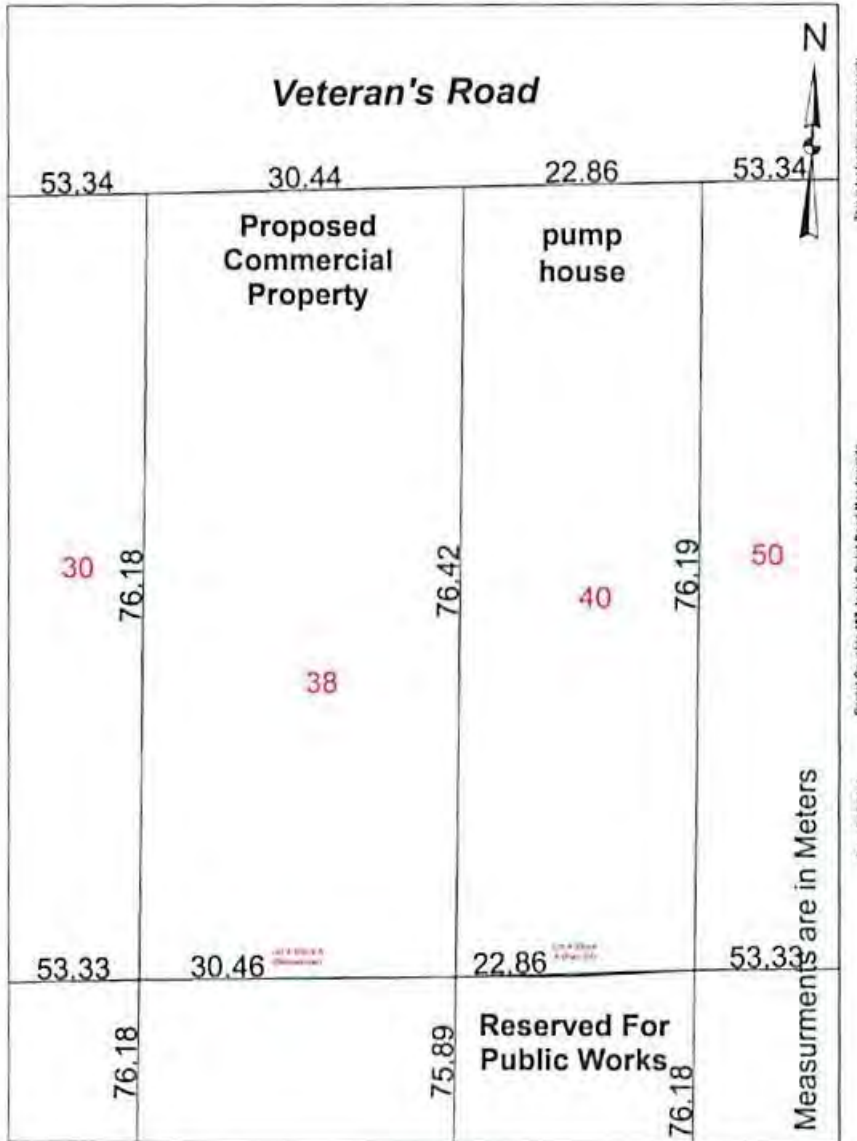

Each team completed their pitch and business plan and made their presentation in front of

a panel of judges, along with other groups in their sector for a chance to win prize money and bursaries. Although we didn't get any bursaries, our students were winners just for participating in such a worthwhile learning experience. We're proud of their accomplishments this year and we look forward to the competition next year!

The **Outdoor Education Class** had the privilege of learning the beginning steps of hide tanning from Brenda Lee and Amanda Bellefeuille. We used the hide of the moose that some of students harvested on a school trip in the fall and worked it down to rawhide. This rawhide will be used to repair our grandfather drum and for various crafts at the school.



Larry McLeod conducted our **Annual School Sweat** on May 22nd to try and coincide with fasting time in Northern Ontario. All students attend the outdoor experience with teachings and a feast. Students who wish to go in the sweat lodge sing songs and take what they want from this ceremony. Sometimes a student requests a spirit name.

On May 28th, students attended the community-based **Water Ceremony**. This annual event honours new life and a new year of connection with creation. Our Elder Peter Beaucage conducted this ceremony.

On May 29th, Nbisiing Secondary School held the **Annual Feast of the Drum** for our grandfather drums and hand drums. In addition, personal drums were invited to be honoured. This activity renews our respect for those teachings that have been handed down by the Elders. Our Elder Peter Beaucage conducted this ceremony.

On **Wednesday, June 10th at 5:00p.m.**, we will have our 19th annual **Walk Against Impaired Driving**. Presentations and barbeque will follow the walk at the Band Office Gym at 5:00 p.m. Once again Mike Stevens of Dutrisac Cottages has generously offered the wagon ride for the seniors, adults and young children who have difficulty walking around the community. I hope to see you there! Below is some information on Mental Health and Addictions:

What is Mental Health ?

Mental Health influences how we think and feel about ourselves and others and how we understand things or events in our lives. It affects our ability to communicate, our ability to learn or how we form relationships with family, friends and others. It also affects our coping ability and feelings to life events.

Facts about Mental Illness:

- Mental Health problems are common. Over the course of a person's life, it is highly likely that they will develop a mental health problem themselves, or have close contact with someone who does.
- In Canada, 1 person in 5 will experience some kind of problem with their mental health in a course of a year.
- In Canada, 1 person in 3 will experience a mental health problem in their life time.

Mental Health problems often first develop during adolescence or early adulthood.

Half of all mental health disorders begin by age 14, and 75% begin by age 24. While these averages are useful in showing different patterns, it is important to note that there is a wide range. Some people will experience a disorder much earlier or later than the average age. Some mental health problems cloud clear thinking and good decision making. A person experiencing mental health problems may not realize they need help or that help is available. They may be in distress and unable to think clearly about what they can or should do.

Hypoglycemia

What is it? A low is a blood sugar level less than 4.0mmol/L

Who is at Risk? Anyone with diabetes who is taking insulin or oral anti-hyperglycemic agents (diabetes pills)

When may it happen? This might happen if/when you: eat less than planned or delay a meal too long, take more medication than planned, are more active than planned and have more alcoholic drinks without eating.

What are the symptoms?

Shaking	Fast Heartbeat	Sweating	Hunger
Anxiety	Nausea	Headache	Impaired Vision
Dizziness	Irritability	Drowsiness/Fatigue	Unconscious

SYMPTOMS: ■ MILD ■ MODERATE ■ SEVERE

Different levels of low sugar lead to different symptoms. Test your blood sugar to confirm you are low. If testing is not possible, TREAT first, then check your sugar level.

How to treat Hypoglycemia

Severe low – you will need help to treat

- If conscious & able to swallow: Give 20g fast acting Carbohydrate**
 - 4 glucose tablets (5g each), or
 - 4 tpsps of sugar or honey
- If Unconscious:**
 - Give glucagon injection OR CALL 911
- Check your blood sugar again in 15 minutes.** Treat again if blood glucose remains less than 4 mmol/L. Keep checking every 2 hours until it is stable.

Mild and Moderate lows

Take 15g of fast acting Carbohydrate

- 3 glucose tablets (5g each), or
- 3/4 cup regular pop, or
- 3 tpsps of sugar or honey, or
- 6 Life Savers[®], or
- discuss other options with your healthcare professional

Check your blood sugar again in 15 minutes. Treat again if blood glucose remains less than 4 mmol/L.

Once your blood sugar is normal again, have your usual meal or snack. If your usual meal is more than 60 minutes away have a snack including 15 grams of carbohydrate and a protein source.

For example have a snack including 4-6 crackers with peanut butter or cheese.

Look for the cause, so you can prevent this from happening again!

How to prevent Hypoglycemia

- ⇒ Test frequently, know what your blood sugar is.
- ⇒ Eat meals at regular times.
- ⇒ Plan for exercise, by either eating more or reducing your medication.
- ⇒ Always have something to eat when having an alcoholic drink.

Discuss the episode with your healthcare team to see how to prevent lows from happening.

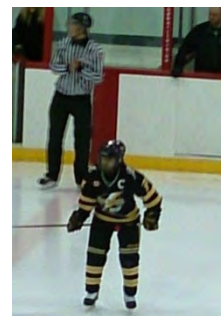
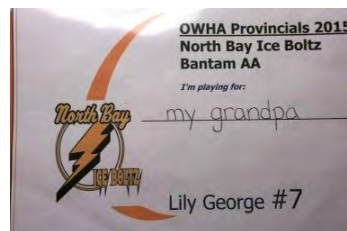

Did you know...

Children's Aid & Your Individual Rights

- ⇒ **That it is your right** to have your band representative present if Children's Aid requests a visit with you and family
- ⇒ It is also **your right** to refuse a visit until your band representative is available and present
- ⇒ Your band representative will advocate on you and your family's behalf, to ensure the best interest of the child
- ⇒ This service is available to all band members on and off reserve within the Nipissing First Nations jurisdiction
- ⇒ The band has an obligation to ensure the best interest of the child; regardless of whether or not the parent/family chooses to access the Native Child Welfare Services
- ⇒ Child and Family Service Act: If you find yourself in a child welfare situation, parts of the Child and Family Service Act take into account the family's Aboriginal culture and heritage in deciding the "best interests" of a child.
- ⇒ Another section of the Act recognizes that Aboriginal people should be entitled, whenever possible, to provide their own child and family services, and that all services to Aboriginal children and families "should be provided in a manner that recognizes their culture, heritage and traditions and the concept of the extended family.

NIPISSING FIRST NATION

LAKE STURGEON LARVAL DRIFT ASSESSMENT

The Anishinabek/Ontario Fisheries Resource Centre (A/OFRC), in partnership with Nipissing First Nation will be conducting a Lake Sturgeon Larval Drift Assessment in the South River of Lake Nipissing in May 2015. The study will take place mid-May, when water temperatures reach 8°C. This study is intended to build on past Lake Sturgeon spawning surveys (2001, 2002), while adding new information regarding larval Lake Sturgeon. The A/OFRC and Nipissing First Nation staff will be setting short set gill nets, eggs mats and larval drift nets in the South River. Side sonar will also be used in the river to categorize the type of substrate, which will aid in characterizing habitat availability for



spawning Lake Sturgeon. All information gathered will contribute to the protection and recovery of Lake Sturgeon by identifying important habitat features and confirming that larval Lake Sturgeon utilize certain areas of the South River.



The A/OFRC is a not-for-profit organization that serves as an independent source of information for communities within the Anishinabek Nation. The Centre provides information and recommendations for sustainable fisheries management, reports of stock status, evaluates stresses on fish populations and habitats, and offers technical support.
