KEB Building Tender Awarded

NFN has awarded the contract for the construction of the Kinoomaadziwin Education Body building to Kenalex Construction.

The building will be located in the Bineshii Business Park and will house 12 staff when it is completed in the fall of 2018.

NFN will be providing space for three to five staff initially within our Administration Complex until construction is completed.

There will be opportunities in the future for other First Nations participating in the AES to house their Regional Education offices with a minimum of 2 staff.

In addition, the building design includes 5,000 square feet of commercial space that will be available for NFN businesses to lease in the fall of 2018.

Anishinabek Nation Education Agreement Act

2nd & 3rd reading of Bill C-61 in House of Commons

On October 31st, Bill C-61, the *Anishinabek Nation Education Agreement Act* (ANEA), will receive 2nd and 3rd reading in the House of Commons. Deputy Chief Muriel Sawyer will be attending to represent Nipissing and to hopefully witness the ANEA become a concrete step on the path to self-determination and self-governance.

The future of the Anishinabek Education System relies upon the success of this Bill. Letters were sent by both Chief McLeod and our Education Committee to Nipissing-Timiskaming Member of Parliament Anthony Rota asking him to support Bill C-61. The support of MPs and Senators is critical as they are the federal law-makers for the Government of Canada and will vote on the ANEA Act on October 31st.

The Anishinabek Nation led lobbying efforts and provided helpful information kits that were posted to our website and social media to assist members who wished to lobby their MPs and Senators to support Bill C-61. Lobbying is a crucial if we want to have a say in the decisions that the government makes. The Federal government must pass Bill C-61 and give it the force of law by the target date of April 1, 2018 for the Anishinabek Education System to open its doors and be operational on April 1, 2018.

What is the Anishinabek Nation Education Agreement?

The Anishinabek Nation Education Agreement (ANEA) is a self-government agreement between Canada and 23 Anishinabek First Nations that recognizes First Nation control over Junior Kindergarten to Grade 12 Education on and off-reserve. It is the first agreement of its kind in Ontario, and it is the largest education self-government agreement in Canada due to the number of First Nations involved.

The ANEA with Canada will provide reliable funding to operate the stand-alone Anishinabek Education System (AES), a system parallel to its provincial counterparts, where Participating First Nations (PFNs) have full control over how to best allocate education funding.

The ANEA supports the Anishinabek Nation's vision of a quality AES that promotes Anishinaabe culture and language and improves education outcomes for Anishinabek students. After the ANEA takes effect, certain provisions of the *Indian Act* that deal with education will no longer apply to the 23 PFNs. The decision-making power over education will rest in the hands of the First Nations under the AES.

The ANEA sets out a process for other Anishinabek Nation First Nations and other First Nations in Ontario to join the AES in the future should they choose to do so.

Why is this important?

The AES is developed *by* Anishinabek *for* Anishinabek. Supporting the ANEA is an opportunity for reconciliation and to support an education system designed to undo the harm our people have suffered through the Residential School System.



The AES supports the education of Anishinabek Nation culture and language that will strengthen the survival of our Nation, while also supporting sharing of our culture and history with all students in Ontario through the *Master Education Agreement*. To learn more, visit: savyestoaes.ca

Ontario Juries Need First Nations Representation

Ministry of the Attorney General Asks First Nations People to Fill out Juror Questionnaire

Every fall, the Ministry of the Attorney General sends out juror questionnaires to people across the province. This year's questionnaires will be mailed out between September and November. About one in 12 people living in Ontario will get one in the mail this fall.

If you receive a juror questionnaire, please fill it out. Filling out a questionnaire does not mean that you will be chosen for jury service, but it's the first step. People who sit on a jury share their wisdom and experience to benefit other jury members and the community. Every courthouse needs jurors for criminal trials, civil trials, and coroner's inquests. People who are selected will receive a summons in the mail. If you need to travel to court, you can call the courthouse and ask for help booking travel and a hotel. They may even be able to arrange to pay jurors' expenses in advance, including meals, hotel and travel.

The Problem

There are not enough First Nations people on Ontario's jury rolls. In some places, judges have decided that a trial would not be fair because there were not enough First Nations people on the jury roll. In those cases, the trial or inquest could not go ahead. Everyone involved was denied peaceful closure.

The Solution

The ministry is asking people who receive a juror questionnaire to complete and return the form as soon as possible so that the jury roll includes your First Nations community. It can also mean that trials and inquests can go forward and there is closure for everyone, including victims and families.

You can help make sure that Ontario juries benefit from First Nations wisdom and experience by filling out the juror questionnaire. Robinson Huron Treaty Legal Case

The following is a special notice issued by Mike Restoule, Chairperson of the Robinson Huron Treaty Litigation Fund, regarding annuity payments. The court case is about the government's failure to implement specific commitments of the Robinson Huron Treaty of 1850 (of which Nipissing is a signatory), and specifically the annuity augmentation of the treaty. The annual annuity paid to band members has not increased from \$4 per band member since 1874.

First Week of Hearings in Thunder Bay

The week of October 16-19, 2017 in the Courthouse at 125 Brodie Street North in Thunder Bay, our key expert witness for our Treaty Annuities Case, Mr. Jim Morrison, gave evidence of the historical facts of making the treaty in 1850.

Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre, Little Current

The Court then moved to Little Current, Ontario at the First Nation owned Manitoulin Hotel and Conference Centre in the week of October 24-27, 2017. Ogimaa Duke Peltier of Wiikwemkoong Unceded Territory and Angus Toulouse of Sagamok Anishnawbek will introduce and speak to the court about our Anishinaabe Elder witnesses. Our Expert Witness, Alan Corbiere of M'Chigeeng First Nation will speak to the court about the Anishinaabe historical relationships and the traditional processes of treaty making. Elder Rita Corbiere of Wiikwemkoong will speak to the court about the importance of the Anishinabemowin language and how the Anishinabek understood the treaty-making process.

We strongly encourage all of the Treaty Chiefs and citizens of the communities to attend the court hearings. Schools in the area are invited to bring some of their students to the court also. We will also have a feast and ceremony on Thursday, October 26, 2017 in Aundeck Omni Kaning at the Community Centre starting at 5:30 p.m. All Anishinabek are invited to attend.

Garden River First Nation

The week of October 30 - November 3, 2017, court hearings will resume at the Community Centre in Garden River First Nation where chief Dean Sayers and Elder Irene Stevens of Batchewana will give Anishinaabe evidence. Our Anishinaabe Elder Expert, Fred Kelly of the Treaty #3 area, will give evidence about Anishinaabe law. The week will end with Expert Witness, Heidi Bohaker, who will give historical evidence of treaty-making and the clan systems and governance relationships of the Anishinabek leading up to treaty-making. This will be an exciting week where our traditions, laws and culture are presented to the court. All RHT Chiefs and First Nation citizens are invited to attend. Chiefs are asked to bring their Staffs to the courthouse. A traditional celebration feast will be held at the Recreation Centre on Syrette Road starting at 5:30 p.m. Everyone is invited to the court hearings and feast.

Trespassing Notices

Former CN Rail bed, Mooz Milkan, and all NFN bush roads and trails

Hunting season has arrived and with that comes issues of trespassing on Nipissing First Nation Lands. The Natural Resources Department and Anishinabek Police Service will be doing regular patrols on NFN bush roads to monitor activity and attempt to reduce the amount of trespassing that has been occurring over the past several years.

Non-Status hunters are required to be in the company of a NFN member while hunting on NFN Lands at all times. Non -Status hunters are also required to obtain, for a fee, a hunting permit from NFN and have a Provincial hunting license/ tag. FWIN Update

Due to warmer than usual water temperatures, the Fall Walleye Index Netting (FWIN) took place a bit later than usual this year.

The process began the week of October 9th and was completed on October 20th.

FWIN is a standardized assessment technique that involves a number of nets being set in randomly selected locations to help determine population health and characteristics.

NFN has partnered with the MNR for over 20 years to collect data that informs decision-making about the lake Nipissing fishery.

This data helps determine the status of the walleye population by assessing the overall walleye health and population dynamics (i.e. age and sex classification).

NFN Hosts National Fisheries Committee Meeting

We were honoured to host the Assembly of First Nations' (AFN) National Fisheries Committee (NFC) meeting from October 3-5 in Garden Village. The NFC consists of Chiefs and Fisheries Technicians from across the country who advise the AFN's Environmental Stewardship Secretariat Fisheries Unit in order to support First Nations in "creating, maintaining, and managing vibrant coastal and in-land fisheries which are central to community socio-economic wellbeing and traditional cultures".

The NFC's three-day agenda included discussions about national fisheries initiatives, the implementation of Supreme Court decisions, planning for a National Inherent Rights Fisheries Forum, updates on aquaculture and fisheries laws, and a roundtable on First Nation perspectives on legislative, regulatory and policy reviews.

The first day of meetings opened with a prayer by NFN Elder Evelyn McLeod and a song by Lester Mianskum. Head Gitzit Gordon Waindubence of Sheguiandah First Nation shared a few words of wisdom and spoke of the importance of fisheries to our culture and our spirit. He reminded us that we have our own laws, our own policies and our own ways of doing things, and if we start walking the path the way we're supposed to, it will become easier. He tied this to the importance of First Nations communities ratifying their own constitutions, and reflected on the preamble to the Anishinabek Chi-Naaknigewin, which ends with: "Creator gave us sovereignty to govern ourselves. We respect and honour the past, present and future."

Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee also stressed the importance of nations re-establishing their law-making authority by proving their jurisdiction and ability to enforce it. He reminded us that we have been here since time immemorial and that although newcomers came and tried to change who we are, what we think and what we do, we are resilient and there's nothing they can teach us about resource management and how we live our lives.

Grand Council Chief Madahbee added that fisheries are intertwined with economic benefit, and that there's nothing wrong with commercial fishing if it's done properly. But with rights come responsibilities and our people need to manage resources properly and be sensible. Those who abuse the resources we've been gifted with for their own personal gain or to feed habits cannot be allowed to continue doing so. It's a matter of respect – for the fish, for the resources, and for First Nation rules and protocols that are designed to manage the resources.



NFC members toured the NFN community to learn more about our assets and opportunities.

UPDATES

Chief Scott McLeod also spoke of the importance of creating our own laws and asserting our jurisdiction over our lands, waters and resources. Under our Gichi-Naaknigewin (Constitution), we are obligated to protect our natural resources. He acknowledged that there have been challenges in enforcing our *Fisheries Law* in the past, and that our Chief and Council's mandate and new working relationship with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) - as formalized through a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) - has been misunderstood and challenged by some, but overall non-compliance has been minimized.

Our community, like many other First Nations, has had a difficult history with the MNRF, which has included discriminatory government policies, practices and unilateral action against our nation members. However, the MOU is intended to continue on the path of reconciliation and good faith through discussions between both parties about Aboriginal restorative justice, recognition of the NFN Gichi-Naaknigewin, and rebuilding the parties' relationship. Both parties have a shared goal of sustainably managing the Lake Nipissing fishery for current and future generations.

Chief McLeod emphasized that NFN's Council, through the MOU, is acting to implement the will of the community. In 2014, NFN community members were clear in the concerns they expressed about the current health and future sustainability of the fishery, and the need for change. The enforcement of our *Fisheries Law* is about protecting and nurturing the recovery of the walleye population to ensure the growth and sustainability of the fishery and Lake Nipissing.

The MOU specifically states that the MNRF recognizes and respects NFN's treaty-protected inherent rights, and our ongoing efforts to regulate and manage our commercial fishery in a manner that ensures the long-term sustainability of the resource for the benefit of all NFN members. It does not apply to sustenance fishing, nor does it in any way degrade or diminish our rights. Rather, the MOU enables the delivery of resources to support *our* initiatives and implement *our* law, while establishing firm protocols that prevent the MNRF from acting without our knowledge and consent. The MOU in no way revokes our treaty rights, but rather reaffirms them. Our rights are collective in nature and are dependent on our continued existence as a strong nation of people.

As reflected in our Gichi-Naaknigewin, Nipissing First Nation has exclusive jurisdiction to make laws with respect to environmental protection of natural resources. These laws shall be in accordance with Nipissing First Nation cultural practices designed to sustain and maintain our lands, fish, forest, wildlife, water and air, and our heritage for future generations.

We are grateful to have had the opportunity to host such an important AFN committee meeting on our territory, and are humbled that Nipissing First Nation was featured on a national level for its leadership in Fisheries Management.

About the AFN's National Fisheries Program

The Assembly of First Nations (AFN) Environmental Stewardship Secretariat – Fisheries Unit continues to work towards the implementation of the AFN National Fisheries Strategy (AFN-NFS). Fisheries, aquatic and ocean resources continue to represent an integral part of the diet, socio-economic well-being and cultural survival of First Nation communities.

The National Fisheries Strategy is designed to assist and restore First Nations' rightful role in managing the fisheries, aquatic and oceans resources. The NFS is a long-term plan that embodies the recognition, protection and implementation of First Nations' Aboriginal and Treaty rights. The Strategy addresses a broad range of First Nation priority issues as well as discusses key policy and program sectors within the Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO) that impacts and requires input from First Nations. In addition, the Strategy also supports and promotes sustainable First Nation fisheries in the inland and coastal aquatic and ocean resources.

AFN Fisheries Program has a broad mandate to support First Nations in multiple thematic areas related to fisheries and aquatic resources. The Fisheries Program supports First Nations in creating, maintaining, and managing vibrant coastal and in-land fisheries which are central to community socio-economic wellbeing and traditional cultures. The Fisheries Program is advised by the National Fisheries Committee (NFC) and works closely with First Nation communities and technicians, academic institutions, and government partners to implement the AFN National Fisheries Strategy.
