Construction Begins in Duchesnay

New Daycare & Community Centre Breaks Ground

There's a bit more activity than usual lately in the area of Nbisiing Secondary School in Duchesnay. The long-awaited construction of a new daycare facility and needed community centre for our east end residents got underway on October 18th and is slated to be complete in July 2019.

With a similar design to the Nipissing Ojibway Daycare and Education Office in Garden Village, the building will house the daycare, as well as a hall and kitchen to host community events and smaller private functions (birthdays, small receptions) with a capacity of 100 people.

The overall footprint of the building will be 7,380 ft², with 4,443 ft² allocated to the community hall and 3,337 ft² for the daycare.



KEB Office & NFN Small Business Centre Opens

Last November, we announced that the construction tender for the Kinoomaadziwin Education Body (KEB) Head Office and Bineshii Small Business Centre had been awarded to Kenalex Construction through a competitive bid process.

Less than a year later, on October 2nd, the KEB celebrated the grand opening of their new office in the Bineshii Business Park in Yellek. The building includes office space for 10 KEB staff members and two regional representatives, and was designed to include five (5) commercial units for NFN businesses.

The Effects of Legal Cannabis

What it means for Nipissing First Nation

Federal legislation making cannabis legal across the country took effect on October 17th, but Ontario's legislation is not yet finalized and proclaimed into force. While the federal government has left regulation up to the provinces, First Nations reserves are considered federal lands, which leaves us with many unanswered questions about how cannabis will be regulated and controlled,

and how we can manage the effects of legal cannabis within our jurisdiction using either Ontario's laws or our own laws created under our NFN Gichi-Naaknigewin.

In the weeks leading up to legalization, our senior staff attended meetings to learn more about how the new framework was going to roll out. Days before legalization, on October 15th, representatives from the Ministry of the Attorney General visited NFN to present Ontario's initial plan to manage legal cannabis sales exclusively through the online Ontario Cannabis Store at the outset, and then shifting to a private retail store model starting April 1, 2019. These retail stores will be overseen by the Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario and will have strict licensing parameters.

Retail Stores

Municipalities have until January 22nd to decide whether or not they will opt-out of cannabis retail stores operating within their boundaries starting on April 1st. First Nations, however, are not bound by a deadline to decide. Ontario's legislation offers provisions that allow for on-reserve delivery prohibitions; retail store opt-outs and approvals; and agreements between Band Councils and the Attorney General with respect to regulation, licensing and authorization of retail stores on-reserve.

Back in March, Chief and Council passed a motion prohibiting the issuance of any business licenses for activities related to the growth and/or sale of cannabis products. This is not a permanent ban, but a temporary measure until Ontario laws are in place *and* until we have consulted with our Debendaagziwaad about how we should proceed under the new legislation.

While cannabis may present economic opportunities for NFN and/or member-owned businesses, details around licensing, regulation, and even revenue and taxation models remain unclear. Above all, any potential economic benefits must be weighed against real health and social impacts.

Developing Our Own Cannabis Law

It is anticipated that Chief and Council will be developing a Cannabis Law under the NFN Gichi-Naaknigewin and NFN Land Code. This law will address a number of issues related to retail sales, the use of cannabis in public places, and many other concerns.

To inform the development of this law, community consultations will be held to find out how our citizens feel about cannabis, particularly in terms of private retail sales and business ventures. The *Annual Community Meeting* on Saturday, November 24th at Nbisiing School will provide an opportunity for us to share information with community members and gather some initial feedback that can be brought forward for consideration at the consultation meetings. Other opportunities to offer feedback will be provided via mail and online methods to reach as many people as possible.

Community Consultation Dates to Be Announced



We are targeting end of November or early December for consultations about cannabis. Your feedback will determine how we move forward under the new legislation.





It was done secretly because the MNR was always after the people.

(Clarence Chevrier's family was considered "non-status anishinaabe" at the time by the government. They spoke the language fluently and they had missed the native registration dates set up by the government. This also happened to the Whiteducks, McQuaabies, Stevens and Larivieres). Milgwech.



Beat the Silent Killer Carbon Monoxide Prevention



In Ontario, over 65% of all injuries and deaths due to carbon monoxide occur in homes.


If your home has a fuel-burning appliance or an attached garage, install a carbon monoxide alarm adjacent to each sleeping area.

For added protection, install a carbon monoxide alarm on every storey of the home according to manufacturer's instructions.

Alarm Locations

Take Action:

1. Install and regularly test carbon monoxide and smoke alarms.

Make sure YOUR household is safe from carbon monoxide poisoning.

Homeowners and landlords are responsible for ensuring their properties have working carbon monoxide (CO) alarms. This includes:

Testing

 It is recommended that carbon monoxide alarms be tested monthly or in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.

Batteries

- Replace batteries in carbon monoxide alarms once a year or whenever the low-battery warning sounds.
- Know the difference between a low-battery warning and an emergency alarm – consult the CO alarm manufacturer's instructions.

Replace CO alarms:

- In accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.
- Know what the "end-of-life" warning sounds like consult the CO alarm manufacturer's instructions.

Landlords:

- Landlords are responsible to ensure working carbon monoxide alarms are installed and maintained in their rental properties.
- The law requires landlords to test CO alarms in rental units annually and when the battery is replaced, changes are made to the electric circuit or a change in tenancy occurs. CO alarms must be tested by pressing the test button.
- The law requires landlords to provide CO alarm manufacturer's maintenance instructions to tenants.

Tenants:

- . The law requires tenants to notify the landlord if the CO alarm is inoperable.
- It is against the law for tenants to remove the batteries or tamper with the alarm in any way.

Exposure to CO can cause flu-like symptoms.

If your CO alarm sounds, and you or other occupants suffer from symptoms of CO poisoning, get everyone out of the home immediately. Then call 9-1-1 or your local emergency services number from outside the building.

If your CO alarm sounds, and no one is suffering from symptoms of CO poisoning, check to see if the battery needs replacing, or the alarm has reached its "end-of-life" before calling 9-1-1.
