We Said "Yes" to the AES... What Now?

The eligible voters of Nipissing First Nation voted "yes" to the *Anishinabek Nation Education Agreement* in December 2016. This "yes" vote means that Nipissing First Nation is part of the Anishinabek Education System (AES).

With 96% of votes cast being in favour of the Agreement, Nipissing First Nation was one of 27 communities that had an overwhelming "yes" vote and one of 14 communities that met the vote requirements.

Even though the majority of eligible voters in some communities that voted said "yes", there were not enough votes to convince Canada that they approved the Anishinabek Nation Education Agreement. To satisfy the Government of Canada's internal requirements and affirm the initial "yes" vote, 11 other First Nations chose to run a second vote in July 2017. The eligible voters of nine (9) First Nations reaffirmed their high level of support with majority votes cast being in favour of the Agreement.

On August 16, 2017, we joined 22 other First Nations that also voted "yes" to sign the *Anishinabek Nation Education Agreement* with Canada and the *Master Education Agreement* with Ontario. Together, these agreements will support the implementation of the Anishinabek Education System.

Under the AES, Anishinabek fully control education, including priorities and spending. First Nations will make education laws for schools on reserve (such as Nbisiing Secondary School), and have full control over how to best allocate education funding. First Nations will continue to make funding decisions for post-secondary students.

There will be no changes to funding amounts without our consent, nor will there be any changes to treaty or aboriginal rights. We can still negotiate treaties and other agreements, including agreements on education, and the Ministers of Indigenous and Northern Affairs have no authority over the AES.

Kinoomaadziwin Education Body

The Kinoomaadziwin Education Body (KEB) was incorporated in January 2011 as a not-for-profit corporation owned and controlled by the Anishinabek First Nations in accordance with a 2010 Grand Council resolution stating that the KEB will:

- ◆ Initiate the educational activities to support the First Nation exercise of jurisdiction over education on-reserve and the delivery of education programs and services by the First Nations
- ◆ Support the First Nations on the selection of the regional representatives to the KEB Board
- ◆ Implement the education strategic plan
- ◆ Report to the Chiefs-in-Assembly at its regular assemblies on the progress achieved and the ongoing plans to establish the Anishinabek Education System.

The KEB takes direction from the First Nations on the steps required to set up the Anishinabek Education System (AES). When the AES is operational, the KEB will support First Nations in their delivery of education programs and services and liaise with the Province on education matters.

The KEB will receive education funding from Canada on behalf of the First Nations and distribute 100% of the program and services funding to the First Nations. The KEB will develop a budget for First Nation approval on how the funding that Canada provides to run the AES will be spent.

Kinoomaadziwin Education Body

Each First Nation that is part of the Anishinabek Education Systems belongs to one of four education regions of the Anishinabek Education System. Each First Nation appoints two (2) representatives to sit on their respective Regional Education Council (REC) under their own selection process. Nipissing First Nation belongs to REC #3 (along with Dokis, Henvey Inlet, Magnetawan, Moose Deer Point, Wahnapiatae and Wasauksing First Nations).

We, the Anishinabek, are responsible to educate our children so that in the generations to follow there will always be Anishinaabe.

KEB Building

NFN has invited qualified contractors to submit tenders for the construction of a building to house the Kinoomaadziwin Education Body on our territory.

The building will be located in the Bineshii Business Park and will house 12 staff when it is completed in the fall of 2018. NFN will be providing space for three to five staff initially within existing facilities until construction is completed.

There will be opportunities in the future for other First Nations participating in the AES to house their Regional Education offices with a minimum of 2 staff.

In addition, the building design includes 5,000 square feet of commercial space that will be available for NFN businesses to lease in the fall of 2018.

Our Economic Development office held a public session on September 16th to highlight this unique opportunity to lease commercial space, and to offer assistance to NFN entrepreneurs and enterprises with business planning and funding needs related to moving to the KEB Small Business Centre.

Another session will be held on Saturday, October 14th from 10am - noon in the lobby of the new wing of the Administration Complex.

Demolition of Building in Garden Village

289 Ted Commanda Drive, Garden Village

At the August 21st meeting, Chief and Council moved to demolish the building located at 289 Ted Commanda Drive in Garden Village (east of Holy Spirit Church). This building, which was constructed as a community hall and later became the daycare before becoming our Lands Office, is very old and has outlived its purpose.

We recognize the history of the building, but also realize that the costs to renovate it to current standards are not reasonable in light of recent developments in the community. The expansion of the Administration Building Complex has allowed us to better meet the needs of our staff and community members by housing the majority of our services under one roof.

We anticipate demolition to begin in early November. During the demolition, we ask community members to avoid the site in the interests of safety.

At this time, there are no plans to construct another building on the site, nor are there any plans to sell or re-allocate the lot. Chief and Council have directed that the site should remain a community area and will keep the community informed about any future plans.

Hydro North Transmission Line

Hydro One will be replacing the sky wire (top) line on the north transmission lines that run through Beaucage and Commanda Townships from September 13 to December 31, 2017.

This maintenance work will involve ground crews as well as the use of a helicopter. Hydro crews will also be using roads and trails on Nipissing Nation to access the transmission lines and bring in equipment required to perform this maintenance.

We are asking all Nipissing hunters, trappers and resource users to be aware of this maintenance work and to use caution when hunting, trapping or 'minnowing' in these areas.

In turn, we have requested that Hydro provide warning signs when they are working in an area. We hope that this work will have minimal disruptions to Nation members harvesting wildlife in these areas.

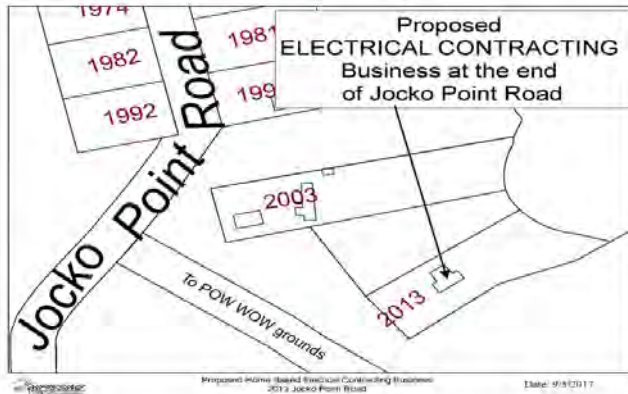

AFN National Fisheries Committee Meeting

NFN will host the Assembly of First Nations' National Fisheries Committee meeting from October 3-5 in Garden Village. We are proud to host this important gathering that will see 40 delegates from across the country meet to discuss various fisheries issues and initiatives, including NFN's leadership in Fisheries Management in Ontario.

We are very pleased to welcome several dignitaries to our territory, including Grand Council Chief Patrick Madahbee, Deputy Grand Council Chief Glen Hare and Elder Gordon Waindubence of the Anishinabek Nation. We are also pleased that Ontario Regional Chief Isadore Day plans to join us and share a few words on the final day of the meeting.

FWIN Update

Due to warmer than usual water temperatures, the Fall Walleye Index Netting (FWIN) will take place in mid-October.

FWIN is a standardized assessment technique and water temperatures need to cool to 15° Celsius before it can begin. As of September 25th, the water temperature was still 21° Celsius.

We will provide an update on this year's FWIN assessment in the next newsletter.

Natural Resources Updates

Hunting Season

Hunting season has arrived and with that comes issues of trespassing on Nipissing First Nation Lands. The Natural Resources Department will be doing regular patrols on NFN bush roads to monitor activity and discussions have been taking place to reduce the amount of trespassing that has occurred over the past several years.

Non-Status hunters are required to obtain, for a fee, a hunting permit from NFN and have a Provincial hunting license/tag. Non-Status hunters are also required to be in the company of an NFN member while hunting on NFN Lands at all times.

Miigwech to our Compliant Fishermen

The Natural Resources Department and NFN membership would like to say 'Miigwech' to registered commercial fishermen who complied with the NFN Fisheries Law this past season. Compliant fishermen allowed inspections by our enforcement staff, submitted catch forms and allowed their catch to be biologically sampled by our assessment staff.

This compliance enables the proper management of our fishery and plays a huge role to ensure the health and recovery of the Lake Nipissing fishery. Protection of Treaty Rights and protection of our fishery is the primary focus of NFN.

To express our appreciation for their efforts, a list of registered compliant fishermen was kept and each fisherman who fully complied was given Tim's Convenience Gift Certificates. Along with this, their names were put into a draw for a Lowrance Fish Finder/GPS unit and the winner of the draw was George Goulais.

Congratulations to George on winning this draw and again, Miigwech to all registered compliant fishermen for their efforts this past season!

Hello, Aanin, Boozhoo, Aniish na? How are you?

Having good mental health means striking a balance in all aspects of your life: social, physical, spiritual, economic and mental. Reaching a balance is a learning process. A person with a mental health problem has a higher risk of having a substance use problem, just as a person with a substance use problem has an increased chance of having a mental health problem. People who have combined, or concurrent, substance use and mental health problems are said to have concurrent disorders.

The following information is from the Government of Canada: Every day, Canadian families and communities are grappling with the devastating effects of problematic opioid use. Opioid-related overdoses have claimed the lives of thousands of Canadians of all ages and walks of life. The collection and sharing of epidemiological data are critical to empowering communities and public health professionals to make informed interventions. Collaboration and information sharing between federal, provincial and territorial governments is crucial to mounting an effective response to this crisis. The most recent data regrettably shows the devastating extent of the crisis, with at least 2,816 apparent opioid-related deaths reported in 2016. Preliminary data for 2017 suggest that the number of opioid-related deaths will almost certainly surpass 3,000 this year.

Available preliminary data indicate that in 2016 there were **at least 2,816 apparent opioid related deaths** in Canada and that the national apparent opioid-related death rate was **7.8 per 100,000**. While the updated data for 2016 show a slight drop in the national mortality rate from the previous estimate, this drop is due to the addition of data from Quebec and does not represent an actual reduction in number of deaths.

Key findings from the updated 2016 data include:

- 73% of apparent opioid-related deaths occurred among males;
- 28% of apparent opioid-related deaths occurred among those aged 30 to 39;
- 52% of apparent opioid-related deaths involved fentanyl-related opioids; and
- 84% of apparent opioid-related deaths involved another intoxicating substance (such as alcohol, cocaine or benzodiazepines).

Available preliminary data for the first quarter of 2017 indicate that there were 602 apparent opioid-related deaths in those three months. Because several provinces and territories are still finalizing their data, it is not possible at present to draw quarterly conclusions based on age and sex. **We expect that the number of apparent overdose deaths in the first quarter of 2017 will surpass the number of deaths in the first quarter of 2016.**

DO YOU KNOW THE SIGNS OF AN OPIOID OVERDOSE AND WHAT TO DO?

SIGNS:

- Blue lips or nails
- Dizziness and confusion
- Can't be woken up
- Choking, gurgling or snoring sounds
- Slow, weak or no breathing
- Drowsiness or difficulty staying awake

CALL 911
Administer naloxone if you have it
STAY with the person until help arrives
