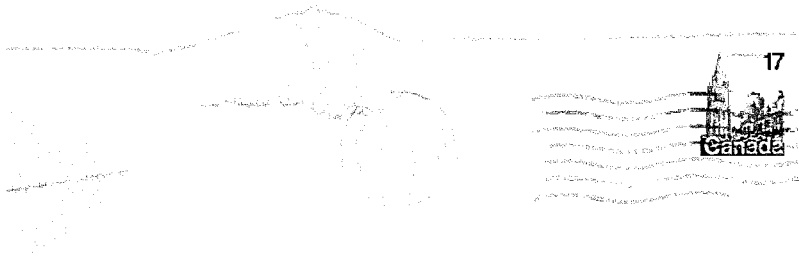
Dear June,

The Cultural Grants Committee will be comprised of one (1) representative each from Manitoulin, Sault Ste. Marie and Sudbury District, Indian Bands and two (2) staff members from the Sudbury District office.

Please note the guidelines state the applicant must have the endorsement or approval of the local band involved and we would suggest you get this in the form of a letter.

Please make sure your applications along with the details of the project arrive in this office before July 5, 1977 for presentation to the committee.

CULTURAL GRANTS FOR NATIVE  
PEOPLE

Cultural grants in limited amounts are available to assist Native people in Ontario in creative endeavours and in the preservation and appreciation of all aspects of their cultural heritage. Top priority will go to individuals who show promise of developing a cultural skill, or who wish to preserve some aspect of Native culture that is in danger of being lost. Careful consideration will be given to requests from Native communities that show initiative and sound planning in the preparation of their activities, and in assuming responsibility for raising appropriate portions of the money locally. Grants are designed specifically for the cultural aspects of a programme, and are not intended for maintenance of the participants while engaged in these activities, nor for general travel expenses. Other agencies might be approached if assistance is required in these areas. Requests from reserve communities will have priority over those from urban areas.

Cultural grants are not designed to assist business ventures, nor those whose main support will come from entrance fees or the sale of products, although a particular non-profit aspect of such a project might be considered.

While grants may be requested in more than one year, it is assumed that once a project is initiated, the participants will assume increasing responsibility for its maintenance. If a second request is made, an accounting for the previous grant should be included.

Application forms may be obtained from District Offices, and should be submitted to the Regional Office through the District Office. Supportative documents should accompany the request describing in some detail the purpose of the activity and the exact use to which the money will be put. In the case of individual requests, recommendations should accompany the application from the local office, and from some competent authority in his field wherever this is appropriate. SAMPLES OF WORK SHOULD NOT BE SENT UNLESS SPECIFICALLY REQUESTED. Artists' supplies may be issued in kind rather than in cash, and a recommendation in this regard may be made.

A committee of Native people has been established to assess requests and to make recommendations regarding the allotment of funds. The committee will meet several times a year for this purpose. It is important therefore that requests for grants for summer activities be received in the Toronto office by April 30th, and for fall activities by July 31st. It is expected that the committee will also meet once or twice during the winter months to review requests of a continuing nature. Requests for grants will be held until the following committee meeting.

It is hoped that these grants may be made known as widely as possible to Native people particularly in isolated and remote districts, and that assistance will be given to them wherever necessary in making a suitable application.

The Committee for Cultural Grants would welcome a wide response.

## GUIDELINES FOR CULTURAL GRANT APPLICATIONS

### Committee

It is desirable that a Cultural Grants Committee be set up to include Indian representatives who have special interest, knowledge and understanding of the cultural areas being supported. This Committee could meet when necessary to review the various applications made to District Offices.

### Application Forms

Application forms would be obtained from District Offices. The application should outline the project, objectives, budget breakdown, number of persons to be involved, desired results, etc.

### Cultural Grants Criteria

Priority should be given to those cultural applications which strive to maintain and retain the traditional cultural patterns relating to a particular group for which no other financial support is now available. It is advisable that grants be approved for individuals or groups who wish to do work in the preservation and development of such areas as the native art, writing, languages and music. Priority should be given to those projects which involve new approaches and people who have not been assisted in former years. When assistance is requested for a subsequent time, the previous performance of the group sponsored should be reviewed.

## Cultural Activities

Pow-wows Because pow-wows are so popular in the western regions, a careful review of the amounts being spent should be considered. It is possible to reduce expenditures by holding district pow-wows instead of numerous, small, local ones. It is hoped that pow-wows will become self-sufficient in future years.

Rodeos In Alberta Rodeos have been considered an agreed on by the Indian people as cultural events but they should be seriously considered recreational in future. It should be noted that monies are now available for recreational activities through the Grants to Bands program.

Local Indian Musical Bands If these groups use Indian music, songs and/or instruments they could be considered for grants; otherwise they would not qualify.

Indian Princess Pageants Indian Princess Pageants do not meet the criteria as traditional cultural events and where held should be funded from other sources.



### Artists

It is important to ensure that a portion of the grant funds will go to the encouragement and development of Indian art. Requests from artists might include funding for art materials, production equipment, studio rent, exhibition expenses, travel costs and living expenses.

### Writers

Indian writers are becoming increasingly more popular with the general Canadian reading public. It is very important that writers be encouraged to develop their writing talents. Requests from writers might include assistance for typing, research and possibly travel related to a specific proposed manuscript.

### Native Language and Music

The collection of traditional legends, music and songs should be given high consideration where the proposed projects would not be funded in the Curriculum Enrichment Program. Monies may be granted for the purchase of equipment, supplies, informant fees, expenses, etc. Copies of materials should also be made available to the informants. Traditional singing societies should also be supported. In all cases, the applicant must have the endorsement or approval of the local band involved. It should be noted that other sources of funding within the Education Program or from outside sources are also available.

Motion carried, all in favour.

A discussion was held on the ways to get the interest of younger women to take part in local clubs; it was suggested by a couple of ladies, that probably courses could be obtained to spark their interests, either sewing, basketry, crochets, knitting or quill work. Courses would be paid by day or week through Manpower or a community college such as Canadore.

Correspondence was read by the secretary. A letter from Mr. Han was read that was advising that \$10,000.00 was available for the Northern Ontario Homemakers' Association. Out of this \$10,000. we were given \$1,500. to hold these meetings.

A letter from Mr. Leafloor was read and Mr. Leafloor was requesting information from us on whether the regional club will change its corporate name or remain the same.

Another letter was read from Mr. Leafloor, it was a letter of default on whether to continue or to dissolve the clubs. The conclusion for this will come about if no interest in the homemakers' clubs are forthcoming. The President asked that all the clubs send in reports, in this way, we may find out how many clubs are active. This is to be done by correspondence.

Leda McLeod then went on to explain that, all receipts, travel warrants etc...are to be sent to her, so the Regional Club may report on how much is being spent so that a Treasurers Report may be made. The report has to be sent to Indian Affairs, with two copies to be sent to the Regional Executive Association. Copies are also to be sent to all existing individual Homemaker clubs so they will have an idea as to what the Regional Executives have been up too. It was also decided that a copy is to be sent to Mr. Leafloor. It is also to be asked if the individual Homemakers' clubs were still in existence.

The subject of travel was then thoroughly discussed as two of our executive members found that travel by train very accommodating, but it stretches their trip into a week, instead of just the two days limited for the meeting. They stated that their travelling costs are rather high as they had to be flown back by Air Canada. It was decided to travel the least expensive way. Eight members had planned to attend the meeting so the \$1,500. has been divided to cover cost for hotel accommodations, the board room, meals, and transportation.

The previous Executive Committee did not have any funds, so we have to start up from scratch. Plans were made to go through all past bank accounts and correspondence which were sent in, the letters were never opened that were addressed to the Executive. Also, a cheque was made in 1977 and was not endorsed, this will be looked into.

The next topic of discussion was transportation to and from school for children on reserves. This matter was seen to be a main target to be looked into where necessary.

Another problem which came to the surface, from one of our members was parents who do not teach their children to speak English suffering the children later to coping with language problems.

The President then emphasized that the importance of reports from all the clubs, as they will give an outlook of what to work on and if field workers are needed to explore other reserves, to form other clubs and stressed the importance to have all receipts and travel warrants sent in.

The hotel board room is \$30.00 per day and the ladies registered in 4 hotel rooms, two to a room at \$25.00 per day. Transportation and meal fees were given to each member, transportation varying on the mode of travel, plane transportation is likely to be omitted in future travelling.

A problem was seen into the lack of equipment for the running of the meetings. Equipment that was seen as needed were a tape recorder, typewriter and a calculator. It was seen as unaffordable as the funding does not stretch to cover this type of expenditure.

A brief was put before the executive asking on how many meetings and conventions were to be held. It was decided that three meetings a year and one Convention annually. It was also agreed to boost the annual fees from 50 cents a year to a \$1.00. This subject was discussed previously but never decided upon. Most of the members said that the clubs have decided on this change, so it stands that annual fees are now \$1.00 a year per member.

Reminiscing took place and comments were made on how the Northern Ontario Homemakers Clubs joined with Southern Ontario and all the new people and places that the members had met. It was hoped by all of the ladies that the Association will resume back to those days.

During the topic of past experiences it was brought to the members attention of the passing of Miss Jane Bartlett a year or so ago. Also Mr. Homer Peters who passed away. They were both very active with the association and were a great help to us in our endeavours and will be missed as they were both very lovely people.
