Offices Reopening to Staff on February 7th

All Offices Remain Closed to the Public until Further Notice

On December 7th, we reopened our offices to the public two days a week. Then, the Omicron variant arrived and we returned to remote work measures on December 20th ahead of our two-week Christmas closure. The majority of staff will continue to work remotely until Monday, February 7th when our offices will reopen to staff.

Our Crisis Control Group (CCG) continues to meet bi-weekly to monitor the COVID-19 situation and adapt our pandemic response as needed. Ontario remains in a modified Step Two of the Roadmap to Reopen and plans to gradually ease some public health measures starting on January 31, 2022 as follows:

Ontario cautiously and gradually easing public health measures



January 31

- Social gathering limit of 10 people indoors and 25 people outdoors
- Capacity limit of 50% in indoor public settings, including restaurants
- Spectator capacity limit of 50% or 500 people (whichever is less) at facilities such as sporting events and concert venues



February 21

- Social gathering limit of 25 people indoors and 100 people outdoors
- Removing capacity limits in indoor public settings where proof of vaccination is required
- Capacity limit of 50% at spectator events, including sporting events and concert venues
- Increasing indoor capacity limits to 25% in higher-risk settings where proof of vaccination is required, including nightclubs



March 14

- Increase social gathering limits to 50 people indoors with no limits for outdoor gatherings
- Lifting capacity limits in all indoor public settings. Proof of vaccination will be maintained in existing settings.
- Lifting remaining capacity limits on religious services

Dates are subject to stable or improving health indicators



As we've previously communicated, NFN's COVID-19 Exit Plan depends on the province progressing beyond Step Three of their <u>Plan to Safely Reopen Ontario and Manage COVID-19</u> for the Long-Term as scheduled.


Ontario's return to a modified Step Two has caused us to pause our plans to reopen offices to the public and community spaces for rentals and programming until further notice.

In addition, limited testing capacity and data reporting due to recent changes in provincial guidelines mean that we must remain cautious and do everything we can to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in the community.

Vaccines remain the best line of defense in the fight against this virus and are still available to all ages eligible to receive a first, second or third dose on NFN.

LNHL 2022 Tournament Cancelled

Pandemic forces hockey to take a back seat to health & safety for third year in a row

In a news release issued on January 14th, we announced that Nipissing First Nation (NFN) has decided to cancel the Little Native Hockey League (LNHL) tournament that we planned to host in Mississauga from March 13-17, 2022.

This decision was made in response to the surge in COVID-19 activity across the province resulting from the highly transmissible Omicron variant and is fully supported by the LNHL Executive Committee.

The return to modified Step 2 measures, including restrictions on recreational facilities and gatherings, as well as limited testing capacity and data reporting due to recent changes in provincial guidelines, signals that we are not moving in the right direction.

The continued uncertainty around aspects of daily life that we used to take for granted – from schools being open, to participating in hockey tournaments, and simply the ability to come together without worrying about the safety of our families and communities – makes it clear that cancelling the tournament is the right decision to make at this time.

"While this isn't the kind of three-peat anyone aspires to, the decision to cancel the tournament for the third year in a row was made entirely out of concern for the health and safety of First Nation communities across Ontario, especially those unequipped to deal with increased demands on already very limited resources," said NFN Chief Scott McLeod.

"Although we remain hopeful that the situation will improve in the coming months, this pandemic continues to teach us that we can't predict what will come next. We all hope that this will come to an end sooner than later, but as many have noted, 'hope is not a strategy' and holding a huge hockey tournament amidst an ongoing global pandemic is not a risk that Nipissing First Nation is willing or prepared to take," Chief McLeod added.

"In these rapidly changing and unpredictable times, your health and safety has always been our top priority," said LNHL President Marian Jacko. "I would like to thank the NFN LNHL Host Committee and the NFN Chief and Council for their leadership, their support, and their resilience. On behalf of the LNHL Executive, we express our heartfelt gratitude for their unwavering dedication and support for the Little NHL."

Our LNHL Host Committee and the LNHL Executive discussed the possibility of postponing the tournament until later in the year or hosting a regional format. Having considered the many factors involved with these options, we have agreed that a postponement or alternate format is not feasible.

We have also taken into consideration the vast amount of time and resources that NFN staff have devoted to planning this event since 2019. We are mindful and respectful of their other duties as NFN continues to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic to protect the community.

NFN's Chief and Council will discuss the possibility of Nipissing hosting the LNHL tournament at a later date, however no decision has been made at this time. We will contact our sponsors, partners, volunteers, and special guests in the coming weeks to discuss next steps. We appreciate everyone's patience and understanding as we work through this.

We know many will be saddened by the cancellation of LNHL 2022, but we trust that the rationale behind our decision is clear and sound. Our leadership, LNHL Host Committee and Executive are equally disappointed given how much time and energy we've invested into hosting what would have been an amazing LNHL experience.

Our theme *All Nations, One Family* was intended to be celebrated together. Until we can do so safely again, please keep it in mind as we work together through these difficult times, even if it means staying apart for a little while longer.

Justice for Day Scholars



The Day Scholar Compensation Payment Claims Process is now OPEN. The deadline to apply is October 4, 2023.

A settlement in the Day Scholars Class Action has been approved by the Federal Court, and eligible claimants can apply for the Day Scholar Compensation Payment.

Day Scholars, also known as Survivor Class Members, are people who attended Indian Residential Schools (IRS) as students during the day only but did not sleep there overnight. The Descendant Class Members are the children of Day Scholars.

The settlement agreement provides that every eligible Day Scholar Survivor will be able to make a claim for a Day Scholars Compensation payment of \$10,000. For eligible Day Scholars who were alive as of May 30, 2005, but have died since, a claim can be made on behalf of their estate by an estate executor, administrator, trustee or liquidator, or if none is appointed, their highest priority heir. Canada will also pay \$50 million to establish the Day Scholars Revitalization Fund for the benefit of the Day Scholar Survivors and their Descendants.



What to do if you have Symptoms?

All individuals who have symptoms - even if they are mild - or think they may have been exposed to someone with COVID-19 should isolate immediately. This is one of the best things you can to do limit the spread in your community and protect your loved ones.

Individuals with COVID-19 who are fully vaccinated (at least 2 doses) and not immunocompromised, as well as children under 12 years of age, will be required to self-isolate for at least 5 days after the day their symptoms began.

COVID-19 Vaccine Updates

Vaccines Available for All Ages Eligible within NFN

NFN Health Services continues to offer vaccination clinics for 1st, 2nd and 3rd dose boosters for all ages eligible to receive a vaccine on NFN.

The Health Unit is recommending eight weeks between 1st and 2nd doses for everyone 5 years of age and older. Individuals 18 years of age and older are eligible to receive a 3rd dose 84 days after their 2nd dose.

In the face of the rapidly spreading Omicron variant, we must focus on what we *can* control. Continuing to follow public health measures, limiting our close contacts, and doing everything we can to keep ourselves and our community safe.

The best layer of protection is getting vaccinated, and we thank everyone who has rolled up their sleeves to do their part to protect themselves, their loved ones, and our community. Chi-Miigwech.

As of mid-January, our dedicated Health Services team had held over 81 clinics and administered **over 4,300 doses** of Moderna and Pfizer vaccines, with 3,881 adult doses of Moderna, 344 Pfizer vaccines to youth between the ages of 12-17 years, and 81 Pfizer vaccines to children between the ages of 5-11 years.

New Testing Guidelines

New testing guidelines include First Nations and people travelling into First Nation communities for work as a priority group, whether you have symptoms or not.

If you are seeking a COVID-19 rapid test or PCR test inform the testing centre or pharmacy that you are from Nipissing First Nation when you schedule the appointment

The next provincial stock of COVID-19 rapid antigen testing kits is targeted for staff and students in school settings and staff and children in childcare settings. More information will be provided as these kits become available for other settings, including for the broader community.



The knowledge and wisdom passed through the heredity line are needed for this long journey with Gookmis.

In this time of the Bear Moon, Gookmis awakens the bear to return to the physical world to complete his quest.

At this time it is not wise to get near the bear because he is marking his territory and searching for nourishment, consisting of: different types of berries, roots, and fish.All keep the mind sharp and the body strong and pure, the way the Creator intended from the beginning. Miigwech

PREVENT HEATING EQUIPMENT FIRES

WHAT'S THE RISK?

Heating equipment fires account for 1 in 10 home fires.

Heating equipment is the **second** leading cause of home fires.

In 29% of home heating fires, the cause is lack of routine maintenance of heating equipment.

The average dollar loss per heating equipment fire is \$53,000.

The leading causes of heating equipment fires are:

- woodstoves
- 2. fireplace/fireplace inserts
- 3. chimneys.

How do I prevent a heating fire?


- Have your heating system and chimneys inspected and cleaned annually by a qualified service technician.
- Ensure all outside heating vents are not blocked.
- Ensure woodstoves, fireplaces and fireplace inserts are installed by a qualified technician according to manufacturer's instructions.
- Always use a fire screen around the fireplace.
- Allow ashes from your woodstove or fireplace to cool before emptying them into a metal container with a tight-fitting lid. Keep the container outside.



All homes with a fuel-burning appliance, fireplace or attached garage must have a working carbon monoxide alarm installed outside all sleeping areas.
