


Council Connection Keeping Our Community Informed about Key Issues

Nbisiing Power Grand Opening: Grand Opening to Celebrate Launch of Innovative Partnership NIPISSING FIRST NATION - Nbisiing Power has opened its doors for the first time Friday, May 27th to mark the grand opening of their head office. The public is invited to celebrate the launch of this new business partnership between Nipissing First Nation (NFN) and Composite Power Group. Nbisiing Power's office is located at 132 Osprey Miikan, Suite #100 in the Bineshii Small Business Centre near Yellek. We are honoured that the Anishinabek Nation Grand Council Chief Reg Niganobe and Nipissing First Nation Chief Scott McLeod were in attendance to provide remarks, along with other dignitaries. "As a reseller of electrical power equipment, Nbisiing Power will focus on pursuing Indigenous procurement opportunities with electrical utility companies here in Ontario. We plan to branch out to other key customers across Canada as we grow the sustainability of the business," explains Christine Goulais, Acting Chief Executive Officer. Chief Scott McLeod adds, "this strategic business partnership will ultimately help NFN diversify our economy and build capacity in a relatively new industry where there are plenty of opportunities that aren't currently being realized. We look forward to working with our new partners to maximize this opportunity and deliver benefits for our community through employment and revenue generation."

Garden Village Water Treatment Plant - UPDATE

Cecchetto & Sons Ltd. continue work in Garden Village.

With the water treatment plant upgrade construction well underway we would like to thank everyone for their continuous understanding and patience. Disruptions along the way with extra truck traffic, construction noises, etc. will continue as construction proceeds for the next foreseeable future. The following is being worked on:

- Excavation for the reservoir slab
- Installation of support (sheet piles) for existing watermain
- Reservoir slab framework construction



Composting Kitchen and Yard Waste

CAN BE COMPOSTED



DO NOT COMPOST



- Cardboard (uncoated, small pieces)
- Coffee grounds and filters
- Eggshells
- Fireplace ashes (natural wood only)
- Fruits and vegetables
- Grass clipping
- Hair or fur
- Hay and straw
- Houseplants
- Leaves
- Newspaper (shredded)
- Nutshells
- Paper (uncoated and shredded)
- Sawdust
- Tea bags
- Woodchips
- Yard trimmings

- Dairy products and eqqs (creates odor that can attract wildlife)
- Diseased or insect infested plants (diseases and insects can survive in compost and can be transferred to new plants)
- Fats, grease, lard, and oils (creates odor that can attract wildlife)
- Meat or fish bones and scraps (creates odor that can attract wildlife)
- Pet feces or litter (may contain parasites, bacteria, germs, pathogens, and viruses that can be harmful to humans)
- Yard trimmings treated with chemical pesticides.
 (may kill beneficial composting organisms)
- Cooked foods (creates odor that can attract wildlife)
- Non organic materials (will not break down in compost)
- Coal or charcoal ashes (may contain substances that can be harmful to plants)

Yard Waste

Yard waste such as leaves, twigs, and grass trimmings can be composted or stock pile near composters to use for maintaining proper ratios of greens to browns in your compost bin to ensure compost bin works efficiently.

These wastes can be brought to 1 of the 3 NFN Organic Yard Waste depots located in Garden Village, Jocko Point, and Yellek. These depots are for only organic yard waste limited to Leaves, Grass trimmings, and untreated woods.



Monkeypox

Individuals residing in the Nipissing First Nation region are at a VERY LOW risk of contracting monkeypox. Monkeypox has less severe symptoms than smallpox and is less transmissible. Should monkeypox be reported in our Health Unit's region, the public will be made aware through social media outlets.

HOW IS IT SPREAD? Monkeypox is spread by direct contact with an animal, human, or materials contaminated with the virus. The virus enters the body through broken skin (even if not visible), respiratory tract, or mucous membranes (eyes, nose, or mouth).

WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS? The illness starts with: fever, headache, muscle aches, backache, swollen lymph nodes, chills, & exhaustion. Within 1 to 3 days (sometimes longer) after the appearance of fever, the patient develops a rash, often beginning on the face and then spreading to other parts of the body. The illness typically lasts 2 to 4 weeks. Individuals are no longer infectious when the crusts of the lesions have fallen off revealing new skin below.


HOW IS IT TREATED? Monkeypox, usually doesn't require medical treatment, as most cases will get better on their own. In more severe or high-risk individuals, treatment may include medications or vaccines for smallpox, and supportive care can also be provided (to improve symptoms).

HOWS IS IT PREVENTED?

- Self-isolate and seek testing if you have been exposed to monkeypox and are showing symptoms.
- If you do not have any symptoms you do not need to self-isolate, but should monitor for symptoms for 21 days after exposure.
- Wash your hands with soap and water or with an alcohol-based hand sanitizer after contact with an infected animal or human.
- Use Personal Protective Equipment when required.
- Avoid contact with individuals and animals that could have the virus.
- Avoid contact with materials that have been in contact with a sick animal or person.

We are excited to share some news about opening dates and plans, beaded squares (which we are still accepting), and our plans to share dibaajmiwonan/stories in relationship to the beautiful artwork at the heart of LNBP.

First, please save the date for our opening for Dokis First Nation and Nipissing First Nation members on August 26th, 2022. A coach bus will travel to DFN and NFN to pick up community members and bring them to Nipissing University in the morning to see the Lake Nipissing Beading Project. After lunch, we will then travel to the North Bay Museum to see the "Our Guides are Really Going Places: Nbisiing Guides and the Legacy of Paul Commanda" exhibit (nipissingguides.com). The bus will also travel back home again at the end of the day. Suzanne Campeau Whiteduck will once again take the lead in the activities we are planning for the day, and Bob Goulais will host the bus ride and openings. We will be in touch with details and who to contact to RSVP.

Second, gchi-miigwech to everyone for continuing to send in their beautiful beading. As the project is underway again, you will begin to see posts that include these 130 new tiles on our social media accounts @lakenipissingbeadingproject on Instagram and Facebook.

Third, the next stage of the project will involve collecting dibaajmiwonan/stories to map alongside beaded squares for those who have a story to share about their beading. These stories can be shared in whatever form feels suitable for you – writing, recording, or another form.
