

Protection of Infrastructure

Private residents must get approval from Nipissing First Nation's Public Works Department for any new building connections to any infrastructure of Nipissing First Nation and the building that requires connection must meet the Ontario Building Code or National building code and associated standards. eg (CAN /CSA Z240 MH).

All connections to the infrastructure are to be carried out by the Public Works Department, and require the approval of Steve Doucette, Director of Community Infrastructure & Planning.

Any person who conducts unauthorized connections can be fined up to \$10,000.00 and charged with Mischief under the criminal code of Canada, plus the cost to restore the infrastructure to its original state.

Report Tagged Walleye

A note from the NFN Natural Resources Dept.

We hope the beautiful summer weather got people out on the water as of late! As you may know, Walleye in the 40-to-45 cm size range (total length) were tagged at Wasi Falls in the spring of 2023 and again this spring (2024).

An important part of this project is to get as many captured tagged fish reported as possible. The tags are yellow with the numbers starting with the letters 'ILK' (which is the acronym for the Inland Lakes research group in MNRF) followed by 4 numbers. On the other side of the tags is a phone number you can use to report the tag. Please be on the lookout for these tagged Walleye when conducting your catch sampling and ask all the NFN fishers to report any tagged Walleye they see in the nets.

There are several options for NFN fishers to report catching (and/or harvesting) a tagged Walleye:

- 1. On line at engage.ontario.ca/en/fish-tag-reporting
- 2. Call the number on the tag,
- 3. Call the North Bay District office or
- 4. Inform the NFN natural resources department.

Sarah Hazell, CAAWGUG, Awarded the Governor General's Innovation Award

On May 14, 2024, Sarah Hazell, a member of Nipissing First Nation (NFN) and the Canadian Archaeological Association Working Group on Unmarked Graves (CAAWGUG), was awarded the Governor General's Innovation Award alongside her CAAWGUG group members by Governor General Mary Simon.

The Governor General's Innovation Awards celebrate first-rate Canadian innovation, and are given to individuals, teams, and organizations whose innovations are "truly exceptional, transformative, and positive in their impact on quality of life in Canada." (Governor General's Innovation Awards) The CAAWGUG certainly meet - and even surpass - this criteria.

Their work includes developing resources in conjunction with the search for missing children and unmarked burials to assist and support impacted individuals, sharing their knowledge and expertise with Indigenous communities, advocating to government on behalf of Survivors, and more.

Sarah's contribution to the CAAWGUG as a research archaeologist, anthropologist, and project manager is extensive. Having developed, recorded and disseminated various resources that cover the spectrum of aspects involved in the search for missing children and unmarked burials, her proficiency, dedication, and strong work ethic are evident.

In addition to her work with the CAAWUG, Sarah is completing her PhD thesis in the department of Anthropology at the University of Toronto. Her dissertation focuses on the ancestral Inuit migration from Alaska and the Bering Strait Region into the Canadian Arctic. She has over 25 years of experience as an archeologist and anthropologist, and has worked in the Middle East, the Canadian Arctic, Alaska, and most recently, Northern Ontario.

Sarah has also worked on the archaeological field-school for NFN and has taught many NFN youth about archeology and archeological monitoring. Moreover, she has trained youth in the Lands and Natural Resources field-school here at NFN for the past three years, and will be teaching again this summer.

Sarah and the CAAWGUG are well-deserving of the Governor General's Innovation Award, and NFN is exceedingly proud to witness a member of the community be part of a team that carries out such necessary, meaningful, and significant work. Chi-miigwech, Sarah, for your contributions - not only to NFN, but to all Indigenous communities across Canada.

Through dedication, vision and teamwork, the Mnogin Greenhouse has proved that sustainability and economic progress can go hand in hand.

The indoor growing facility - located on Nipissing First Nation in the Jocko Point community - uses the latest technology to grow high quality lettuces, leafy greens and herbs to serve the North Bay area year-round, all while remaining environmentally friendly.

"The Mnogin Greenhouse is an innovative leader in sustainable agriculture. It uses 90% less water and 95% less land than traditional agricultural practice, while yielding the same number of crops," said Scott McLeod, Chief of Nipissing First Nation.

From an economic standpoint, the greenhouse promotes shopping locally and boosting the local economy, while reducing environmental impacts.

The Mnogin Greenhouse also guarantees highly nutritious produce that stays fresh, as they are produced without the use of synthetic pesticides or herbicides.

Genevieve Couchie, Nipissing First Nation Business Operations Manager, was delighted to hear about the Mnogin Greenhouse's Community Builders award win for Economic Development.

"We're honoured to be recognized with this award. This means a great deal to our team. It affirms the need and appetite for innovative projects like ours," she shared. "It's also a validation of the project's vision to enhance food security on Nipissing First Nation and for the surrounding regions. Given the ongoing disruptions to supply chains and rising food costs, local food production is becoming increasingly important."

"This award highlights the power of collective effort in driving positive change," Couchie added. "We hope it will serve as inspiration for other projects that strengthen local food production and continue pushing the boundaries of sustainable economic development."



The Mnogin Greenhouse hopes to continue to focus on optimizing its operations to achieve the highest quality products.

"We're also always looking for unique new products to introduce to our customers, both individual consumers and our restaurant and retail customers. In time, we hope to expand our operations and look at growing other crops beyond lettuces, leafy greens and herbs," Couchie said.

"'Mnogin' means 'Grow Well' in Nishnaabemwin, Nipissing First Nation's dialect of Ojibwe. We are environmentally friendly and fully embrace the 'Grow Well' philosophy in everything we do," she added.

The Economic Development award goes to an individual or group that has had an important impact on the economic well-being of the community. They have chaired or led a committee, helped bring new business to town, or are responsible for putting in place positive infrastructure.

This award is proudly sponsored by North Bay Plastic Molders Ltd.

The Mnogin Greenhouse also received the Food Sustainability Award from ReThink Green in March 2024.



How to Remove a Tick

Removing a tick is the same for humans and animals. It is important you do not crush or damage the tick because it could cause Lyme bacteria to pass from the tick into your bloodstream.

- Use fine-tipped tweezers and grasp the tick as close to your skin as possible. Do not use a lit match or cigarette, nail polish, nail polish remover, petroleum jelly (e.g., Vaseline), liquid soap, or kerosene to remove the tick.
- Pull the tick straight out, gently but firmly. Do not jerk or twist the tweezers while pulling the tick out.
- Once you have removed the tick, wash your skin with soap and water and then disinfect the bite site with rubbing alcohol.
- Place the tick in a container with a lid.
- Get it identified. Take a zoomed in picture of the tick beside a coin to show relative size.

Elder Profile: Joseph and Susan Couchie

This month, we have another interesting couple: Joseph and Susan Couchie. I'd like to thank Joseph and Susan for participating in the Elder Profile series and sharing their story with us.

Susan's maiden name is Chief. She is one of nine children born to Mary Petrant and Jacob Chief. Her grandparents were Nancy and Jean Chief, and William Petrant. Susan was born on February 11, 1915, in Notre-Dame-du-Nord. Her siblings are Victor, Albert, John, Sherman, George, Claire, Verna, and Mable. Those remaining are Susan, John, Sherman, George, and Claire.

Susan was raised in Notre-Dame-du-Nord. Starting at the age of 6, she went to school off and on, whenever she was able to. Her family worked in lumber camps and did a lot of trapping.

Joseph Couchie was born on April 21, 1904, to John Couchie and Marion Duchesno. He was one of nine children: Catherine, Nancy, Madeline, Ernest, John, Frank, Valentine, Bill, and Joseph – with only Madeline and Joseph remaining. Joseph worked as a guide at the government park from a very young age.

Joseph and Susan met at Bear Island Reserve. They later married on January 1, 1941, at St. Leonard's Church in Duchesnay by Father L. Porchon.


Joseph joined the army in October of 1941 and was discharged in March of the following year. He worked out of his home as a mechanic – a trade he learned on his own – all his life, working on his boat and car motors. He also worked at seasonal jobs at different lodges in Temagami.

Joseph and Susan built their first home in 1947 on the same lot where they reside today. Their new home was built in 1985.

When asked about his younger days as a child, Joseph told me that his family would farm all summer and store food for the winter. "Life was harder back then," he said. "Today, we live like millionaires."

Susan worked as a housekeeper in the custodian department at St. Joseph's Hospital for 22 years before retiring in 1980.

Joseph and Susan like to keep to themselves. They are very outdoorsy people, travelling to different small lakes in the area with their boat and motor in tow, trying their luck fishing. They also keep busy enjoying gardening and snowmobiling.

Soil Remediation Project Update

Work resumed on the soil remediation project on April 1, 2024 in preparation to remove niobium ore tailings from the Nova Beaucage processing mill that operated for seven months in 1956 in Yellek. The ore tailings from the mill were deposited at the mill site and the former gravel borrow pit north of Highway 17 (next to the Anishinabek Nation head office), now owned by the MTO.

The material was later removed from the sites to construct roadbeds, spread locally via grading activities around the site, and used as fill at private residences. All these residences were identified during the initial investigations and are part of the remediation plan.

This update is to communicate the work that has been completed to date and to provide anticipated timelines for operations for the month of July, which is when the excavation of NORM (Naturally Occurring Radioactive Material) will begin.

Work Completed to Date

In April, Nipissing Miller began grubbing non-contaminated areas around the work sites and installing fencing. This non-contaminated material was hauled to the dumpsite on the old Nova Beaucage Road allowance.

Site preparation work took place throughout the month of May and is expected to be completed by the end of June. This work consists of preparing staging and stockpiling areas, as well as constructing haul routes.

Nipissing Miller continues to engage First North Enterprise's excavator and operator, and both First North and Young Forestry Services are providing trucking services to the project.

Anticipated Schedule for July

Please note that timelines in the construction industry are often subject to change due to a variety of factors, including but not limited to weather, material availability, regulatory approvals, site conditions, equipment failures, etc.

Bineshii Business Park Update Land Lease Allocation Policy &

Application Process

On June 10, Chief and Council approved the Commercial/Industrial Land Lease Allocation Policy for the Bineshii Business Park. This policy was developed in collaboration with the Land Office to ensure alignment with land leases and to capture all considerations for the Bineshii Business Park development, including compatibility with existing tenants.

There are currently 14 businesses operating in the Bineshii Business Park. The expansion project adds 23 commercial and light industrial lots to the 76-acre business park, situated on Highway 17 opposite the community of Yellek. We are enthusiastic about this next phase of development and the opportunities it presents to diversify NFN's economy sustainably, while creating long-term benefits for the Nation and its debendaagziwaad.

Leasing commercial and light industrial lots to businesses owned by both NFN members and non-members will generate revenue for Nipissing First Nation and will create employment opportunities for members across different sectors. The revenues generated will be used to maintain and operate the business park, with any surplus funds directed towards supporting community priorities as outlined in NFN's strategic plan.

Applications are now Open!

Applications for commercial or light industrial lots in the Bineshii Business Park will open on June 28. They will be accepted for an initial period of 30 to 60 days to gauge interest from current and potential tenants and to determine suitable lots based on the submitted plans.

This is not a "first come, first served" process; however, we will thoroughly review the initial batch of applications and prioritize applications from NFN members before considering later submissions. All applications will be evaluated based on the applicants' land use requirements, building plans, and their compatibility with the proposed zoning and existing tenants within the business park, if applicable.

Bineshii Business Park Update (con't)

Commercial/Industrial Land Lease **Policy** Summary

Under the approved Commercial/Industrial Land Lease Allocation Policy, once a proponent has satisfied the requirements of the Business Licensing Approval Process, the Land Office will issue an Offer to Lease. This offer designates a suitable lot and sets the annual rental rate for the first five years based on an accredited appraisal of the value of similar vacant land, multiplied by an indicator set by Chief and Council.

For land in Bineshii Business Park appraised at \$100,000 per acre in 2022, the lease rates are:

- Nipissing First Nation members: 7% of assessed value (\$7,000 per acre/year)
- Non-members: 14% of assessed value (\$14,000 per acre/year)

Nipissing First Nation members or Nation-owned businesses receive graduated annual lease rates: 0% in year one, increasing to 100% by year five. Non-members or businesses not majority-owned by members do not

qualify for these graduated annual lease rates. Additional lots and expansions are subject to full rates immediately.

The Offer to Lease allows a one-year period for improvements to be placed on the land in accordance with the approved plans. Upon becoming operational, a 35-year lease is issued with annual rent based on the appraised value and multiplied by an indicator. Rent reviews occur every five (5) years to adjust the indicator if needed by a Band Council Resolution.



Ontario Breeding Bird Atlas 3

The Nipissing First Nation Environment Department is happy to announce our participation in the third installment of the Ontario Breeding Bird Atlas (OBBA).

Data collection for the Ontario Breeding Bird Atlas 3 began on January 1, 2021. Volunteer birders will count and record the presence of breeding birds across Ontario – from the south to the north – for five years.

The OBBA is a volunteer citizen science initiative that has been collecting data on Ontario's breeding bird species since 1981. Data collection for the two previous Ontario atlases ran from 1981-1985 and 2001-2005, followed by the publication of books summarizing the results. The two previous projects were enormous (and successful!). But we're hoping Atlas-3 will be the best one yet – providing an unprecedented understanding of the status, distribution and abundance of the province's birds and a huge database of information that can be used for bird conservation purposes well into the future.

Over the past couple of weeks, you may have noticed someone in a survey vest and clipboard standing roadside in various locations throughout the community during the first few hours of daylight, likely swatting at the swarm of mosquitos surrounding him. This is our Lands and Natural Resources Technician, Lucas Beaver. He is conducting Point Counts for the Atlas, a more specialized type of survey that requires the individual to travel to pre-determined locations and record all birds seen or heard at that point in a 5-minute period.

The data collected over five years provides essential information for researchers, scientists, First Nations, government officials and conservation professionals. It will guide environmental policies and conservation strategies for years to come.

Even though we are in year four of five for Atlas 3, there is still plenty of time to get out there and submit observations!

Algae Tracking Units

No, those aren't UFOs or government surveillance. These are special scientific instruments deployed by the NFN Environment Department that track harmful algae development in the Lake, so we can better predict when a bloom will may happen in the future.

Each algae tracker unit measures the water for:

- Green Algae
- Blue-green Algae / Cyanobacteria
- Turbidity
- Water Temperature
- Solar light, wind, and rain
- GPS position

If you happen to come across one of these units, <u>please</u> do not touch or remove. If you see a unit on shore, contact the Environmental or Natural Resources Department at NFN and they will come retrieve it.




