Previously published - Fred and Leda's life together has been anything but quiet.

Leda Couchie was born to John Couchie Sr. and Edna Laronde in Duchesnay on February 19, 1917. She has three brother and six sisters.



Her family stayed in Duchesnay. She attended the residential school in Spanish and considers it a privilege to have attended the school. The walk to school in the winter was three miles one Leda way. fondly remembers playing baseball with her dad almost every night with other children in the village.

Elder Profile: Fred & Leda McLeod (con't)

Fred McLeod Sr. was born January 15, 1910, to Peter McLeod and Nancy Dechesno in Garden Village. He has three brother and three sisters. Fred's favourite sport was boxing.

Fred and Leda married in Beaucage and have had a good life. They have always lived in Garden Village except for the short time they spent in Meadowside at the beginning of their marriage. Setting up their home in Garden Village back then, they remember their neighbours as: Joe and Maggie Beaucage; William and Marian McLeod; Norman McLeod; Alex Goulais; and Peter McLeod. There was no hydro and no roads for school bus to pick up the children.

Fred has always been self-employed. At first, building and working lumbercamps was his work and later logging year round. During his days in the lumbercamps, Leda would prepare the meals for the 42 men that worked there. Good practice for the amount of children they were later to have.

For years, the McLeod's were known for their large vegetable gardens and farming. There was a fairly large pasure that helf the 13 horses they had at one time. There were also cows and chickens. Leda says, "now all we have is little skipper for a pet - our little dog."

Fred and Leda raised 18 children together. Leda says, You take it one day at a time and depend a lot on the Lord."

Education has always been their main goal and they have managed to put almost all of their children through high school.

Leda ran a small confectionary from her home to pay for figure skating lessons for her two youngest daughters. She finally had to close up shop because she lovingly remarks that her young grandchildren started to help themselves to all the goodies.

Leda has been one of the most involved community members Nipissing Reserve has ever known. She is



known for her strong input into the Separate school board and their bid to have a native trustee on board' her continuous encouragement to see paved roads to Garden Village and to build the new church that stands there today.

She has always been a member of the local Homemaker's club and was once the president of the Northern Ontario Homemaker's Club. She also served two terms as a band councillor, to name but a few.

Her efforts have not gone unnoticed. In both 1979 and 1986, she received two awards from the Nipissing Band for her community spirit and dedication to community life; the Centennial medal on Canada's 100th birthday in recognition of her valuable service to the nation; and in 1982 received a silver medal from Bishop Carter for leadership in the diocese. Leda stresses, "if my hearing was good, would I ever have a dandy time in politics. That's the only thing holding me back."

Life, they feel, is certainly easier. People do not have to carry water to wash the children before school. But, raising children is tougher now than it was then. Children used to obey when they were told - now they have their own minds made up earlier.

Elder Profile: Fred & Leda McLeod (con't)

Children do not experience enough religion and have a hard time knowing the difference between right and wrong.

Leda's favourite hobbies are quilting and babysitting and Fred enjoys playing pool, making wood crafts and furniture and loves to watch news and politics on TV. They have spent a lot of time over the past 20 years watching their grandsons play hockey and did a lot of travelling to enjoy this sport.

Needless to day, the family continues to grow at a steady rate. There are now 48 grandchildren and 13 greatgrandchildren [and more, since the time this profile was originally published].

Long-Term Care at Cassellholme

In addition to the new Elders' Lodges in Garden Village and Duchesnay, Nipissing First Nation partnered with Cassellholme to secure designated First Nation beds, with a priority to NFN members. We would like to prepare in advance of opening to ensure easy transition for our members.

This is part of the new build, with 16 private rooms located within a designated unit named *Cedar*.

Those 55+ who are currently on a waiting list for longterm care or who reside in a long-term care facility away from NFN are encouraged to contact the Lawrence Commanda Health Centre to discuss the Cassellholme project.



NFN Environment Department Awarded Grant for Invasive Species Management

The Nipissing First Nation (NFN) Environment Department is excited to announce the receipt of a new grant aimed at tackling invasive species within our community, with a particular focus on Japanese knotweed. This project builds upon our previous successful efforts in eradicating phragmites and emphasizes the importance of strategic planning in managing invasive species.

Project Goals and Objectives

1. Development of an Integrated Pest Management Plan (IPM)

The primary goal is to develop an Integrated Pest Management Plan (IPM) specifically targeting Japanese Knotweed. Leveraging our previous experiences and advanced technologies such as UAV mapping and GIS, we aim to:

- Estimate the size and location of infestations.
- Assess site accessibility and the potential for spread.
- Evaluate environmental, economic, and social impacts.

The IPM will incorporate considerations of site-specific conditions, native plant diversity, wildlife usage, and water table fluctuations.

UPDATES

NFN Environment Department Awarded Grant for Invasive Species Management (con't)

By focusing on preventing satellite infestations, we aim to curb the spread of Japanese knotweed and protect our local biodiversity and economy. The IPM is expected to be completed after the 2024 field season.

2. Summer Field Program and Youth Engagement

Our project will utilize the department's Summer Field Program to:

- Raise awareness about invasive species within a First Nation context.
- Inspire Indigenous youth to pursue careers in Natural Sciences and Environmental Fields.

Summer students will assist in mapping sites, learning about field equipment, UAV operations, and eradication techniques. They will participate in small-scale eradication efforts and contribute to data collection for the IPM. The fieldwork will take place from July to August 2024. Media from the summer program will be showcased on the Environment Department's website for outreach and educational purposes.

3. Community Awareness and Education

To raise awareness among NFN members and the public, we will:

- Mark significant areas of infection with signage to indicate "zones" of prevalent infestations.
- Prevent further spread through soil or rhizomatous transfer.
- Install specific signage for Japanese knotweed and other invasive species uncovered during field trips.

Conclusion

The NFN Environment Department is committed to protecting our community's natural resources and biodiversity. This new grant enables us to expand our efforts in managing invasive species, utilizing innovative technologies, and engaging our youth in environmental stewardship. Together, we can ensure a healthier and more sustainable environment for future generations.
