Innovative Pharmacy Technician Develops Solution to Improve Patient Safety

Avalon Lupini, a pharmacy technician at Health Sciences North in Sudbury, Ontario, has created an innovative solution to a problem she faced daily – the challenge of manually handwriting expiry labels on medications. Often, these labels would smudge, rendering them illegible and potentially compromising patient safety. Determined to find a better way, Avalon developed SmartyPrints, a printer system that produces high-quality, legible expiry labels efficiently.

Avalon's creativity and dedication to improving pharmacy practice were recently recognized when she was awarded the "Technician Initiative Award" at the Pharmacy Practice Business Awards. This prestigious honor celebrates Canadian pharmacy professionals who demonstrate exceptional patient care and innovation. With \$20,000 in funding from the NFN Small Business Loan Program, Avalon brought *SmartyPrints* to life. Currently, 40 units have been built, and six have been sold. Manufacturing takes place in Sudbury, with parts both domestically sourced and imported. Notably, all design work, engineering, software development, labels, and marketing materials were completed in Canada.

Fisheries and Fish Relations Research Update

Between 2014 to 2017 I was involved in a national research partnership that sought to understand how Western and Indigenous Knowledge Systems could improve the sustainability of fisheries in Canada. The project looked at the relationship between knowledge systems across the Pacific, Arctic, Inland and Atlantic regions in four distinct coastal communities in Canada (<u>www.fishwiks.ca</u>). My research was in partnership with Nipissing First Nation, the Fish-WIKS community partner for the Inland region.

Respect, reciprocity, transparency and accountability are important parts of my research ethics and approach to working in community. To that end, I am writing to share details about a new paper, "Race, Indigenous knowledge, and a relational alternative in fisheries policy research", that was just published in the peer-reviewed journal, Marine Policy. The full article can be found on the journal website in Volume 175:

I began the paper as a critique of the provincial fisheries governance regime but extend my analysis to provide a relational account of Nipissing fish stewardship and fisheries leadership. The knowledge gathered as part of my research can be accessed in other ways too. Community members, Elders, and Knowledge Holders participated in the research, some anonymously, some by name, and many consented to archive their interview transcript at NFN Kendaaswin (Library). To access those transcripts, community members may contact Heritage Manager, Jane Commanda. Other writing about my experience at Lake Nipissing can be found on the NFN website in a series of research vignettes I wrote for Enkamgak between May and October 2016. My 2017 dissertation, "Belonging to the Lake: Knowledge, Governance, and Human-Fish Relations", can also be accessed online at TSpace, the free and secure research repository established by University of Toronto Libraries. And a May 2018 presentation that I delivered at NFN can be found on the FishWIKS website.

Fisheries and Fish Relations Research Update (Continued)

"Race, Indigenous knowledge, and a relational alternative in fisheries policy research" in Marine Policy (vol. 175, 2025):

Abstract

This paper responds to the contemporary academic and policy interest in bridging, integrating, and co-producing knowledge across Indigenous and non-Indigenous difference. I draw on work on fish and fish relations with Nipissing First Nation (NFN), a Nbisiing Nishnaabeg community that governs its fishing activities according to community-derived law. In the form of critical policy analysis, I respond to three core research questions driving a national research partnership on Indigenous and Western knowledge systems in fisheries governance: (1) How and to what extent are different knowledge systems incorporated into fisheries governance and processes by Indigenous nations in Canada at national, regional and local scales? (2) Can varied Indigenous knowledge systems (IKS) be used to improve the effectiveness of fisheries governance at national, regional, and local scales in Canada and internationally? (3) Can various IKS be used to inform and enhance an ecosystem-based approach to fisheries management in Canada and internationally, given the complexities of ecosystems and additional uncertainties posed by climate-induced changes? Indigenous knowledge certainly could and already does improve the effectiveness of fisheries governance in Canada, but this occurs despite the dominant system. At Lake Nipissing,



NFN leadership and an exceptional case of provincial recognition and support for Nbisiing Nishnaabeg law and jurisdiction have resulted in the recovery of the lake's most sought-after fish population. Ultimately, I argue against "knowing" racialized forms of difference and conclude with an alternative, relational approach to fisheries policy and knowledge research.

Council Connections: Monthly Updates from Chief & Council

Chief and Council continue to work diligently to represent our Nation and enhance the lives of debendaagziwaad.

Recently, Chief Stevens attended the 9th Annual Anishinabek Nation Lands and Resources Forum and the Chiefs of Ontario Special Chiefs Assembly, where the **Ontario Final Agreement** was signed. This agreement commits Indigenous Services Canada to provide \$8.5 billion over nine years to address systemic issues in child and family services, prioritizing First Nations children's welfare and allowing communities to decide culturally appropriate services. The agreement also aims to reform the 1965 Agreement, focusing on off-reserve funding and cost-sharing for services.

Councillor Samantha Stevens attended the Food Sovereignty Conference, and Councillor Rick Stevens shared that the RHT annuity amount (\$4) is expected to remain the same while we move forward with negotiations to increase.

Students from the Nbisiing Naadziwin Program spent four days at Camp Petawechuan in the traditional territory of Dokis First Nation guided by knowledge holder Norm Dokis. They deepened their understanding of Bmaadziwin (Anishinabek ways of life) and Kendaaswin (traditional knowledge) through hands-on learning with the land as their teacher and ceremony. Students built tip-ups, caught and prepared pike, set up and maintained a a prospector tent, and played predator vs prey to explore animal survival skills.

Interior Spring Maintenance Checklist

Keep mice out of your vehicle!




